Get up to speed on the beauty and variety of Grand Cayman's motorbikes by heading over to North Side for the Island Riding 2010 Bike Show at Driftwood on Saturday, 24 April, 1pm-6pm.

The inaugural event, being held by Driftwood Bar & Grill in association with the Cayman Islands Motorcycle Riders Association, promises all day Happy Hour drinks specials and music from a local DJ from 7pm to midnight.

Members of the public will be handed ballots and will get to choose which of the numbered bikes on display should win. Attendees will also have the chance to cast their votes for the overall Best in Show.

According to Keith Keller of the Motorcycle Riders Association, bikes entered will fall into the following categories: Harley Davidsons; cruisers (Kawasakis, Hondas and Yamahas); sport bikes (Hondas, Suzukis and Kawasakis).

"There will be trophies awarded for best stock and best modified in each category, as well as a trophy for best of show in both stock and modified groups," said Phil Eckstein, another of the association's organisers.

The bike show is being held as a fundraiser for Cayman Animal Rescue Enthusiasts. The registered charity operates a community spay and neuter programme and a trap, neuter and release feral cat initiative.

The registration fee for those wanting to enter their bikes for the show is \$10.

"We are planning for it to be a great day out for bike lovers. With enough entrants, we are hoping to make a sizeable donation to C.A.R.E.," said Mr Keller.

The charity's aim is to prevent ill-treatment, cruelty and suffering to all domestic animals and to eliminate over-population in their numbers.
